

THEORETICAL BASES OF SOCIAL WORK

INTRODUCTION

This subject is essentially focused on the study of the history of social work and its theoretical bases. Knowledge of the origin of social work and of its development according to particular theories and within various historical/social contexts will allow students to understand how contemporary social work has been shaped. The subject features analysis of the origin of social work, the social conditions that encouraged its appearance, its evolution as a profession and a discipline, and the theories that have had the greatest influence on its development. The epistemology of social work is also considered through the study of the evolution of its concept, object and nature, from the development of its methods and levels of intervention to current trends.
